C: Presenter and Assessor Code of Ethics:

Bowls Australia's Code of Ethics for Presenters and Assessors - Officials

Rationale:

Responsibility for the ethical conduct of sport in Australia rests equally with officials, players, administrators, coaches, spectators, media, governments, organisations, and educators.

The duty of a Presenter and Assessor is to provide, on behalf of Bowls Australia, accreditation, and reaccreditation programs in line with National competency-based training and assessment models and National Official Accreditation Scheme.

Having highly competent officials is paramount in any sport. The process of accrediting and reaccrediting officials is crucial to the continued integrity of our sport.

Goals and expectations:

- To make officiating attractive to more bowlers;
- To simplify the methods of accreditation and reaccreditation;
- To create a pathway for officials to move from club level to international level;
- To assess officials on what they can do, as opposed to what they know;
- To follow Bowls Australia's Presenter/Facilitator Guide for Marker, Measurer and National Umpire and Bowls Australia's Officiating Manual;
- To improve the consistency of facilitating the course and common standards nationally for all officiating.

Bowls Australia's Presenter and Assessor Code of Behaviour

4	Be fair, considerate, constructive, and honest with all members of the group	In delivering the NOAS program your language, manner, punctuality, preparation, and presentation should be of the highest standards
5	Be professional and accept responsibility for your actions	Display respect, dignity, and professionalism always and maintain appropriate records.
6	Seek continual personal improvement and updating on current trends	Continue personal development of skills and knowledge through own professional development.
7	Refrain from any form of personal abuse and harassment	Be alert to any forms of abuse or harassment including verbal, physical or emotional.
8	Provide a safe environment for learning and sharing	Follow BA Guidelines, instruction manuals in line with National competency-based training and assessment models.
9	Be a positive role model for your sport and prospective officials	During course delivery, practice, and assessments and when acting as an official on duty.
