Zone 1 Defeat Zone 13 In A Thrilling End To The Inter-Zone Sides Championships



This year's Inter-Zone Sides Championship was a historymaking event, with the final coming down to an extra-end shootout for the first time ever. In the shoot-out, it was Zone 1 who edged out Zone 13 to win their first-ever Inter-Zone Sides Championships title. Both sides exchanged leads throughout the early stages of the match, and with the match on the line, the live stream rink of Peter Taylor against Ray Pearse produced some of the

best bowls ever seen on live stream. You could sense the tension out on the greens, but it didn't seem to impact the players who produced some of their best shots in those moments.

After 63 ends, both sides were inseparable at 55-55. The tie meant that each of the three rinks had to go out and play an extra end each, with the overall winner of those three ends determining the winner of the match and the Championship. Picking up where they left off, Peter

Taylor and Ray Pearse's teams were peppering the jack, and it came down to Taylor's final bowl which was a pinpoint drive that peeled off two Zone 13 bowls to leave Zone 1 holding shot. An umpire had to be called to measure second shot and, given the circumstances, the official did incredibly well to determine that Zone 1 had picked up a count of two on the rink. Zone 1 skips Luke Jones and Jamie Eichorn each had one bowl left to play, but with Zone 1 holding one shot on one rink and down one shot on the other, they both declared their heads to claim a 58-57 victory in some of the most bizarre circumstances seen on a bowling green. The excitement of the extra-ends were a perfect way to finish what was an incredible final.

The win secured the first ever Inter-Zone Championships title for Zone 1, and no one could argue that they don't deserve it, having beaten Zone 2, Zone 12 and Zone 13 in the process. Incredibly, Zone 13 only lost one rink by a solitary shot across the whole Championship, highlighting just how solid the side has been throughout the event and how tough the competition has been.

In the earlier semi-finals, it was interesting to note that three of the four semi-finalists finished second in their section, again highlighting just how competitive the field has been this year. Zone 13 came up against fellow Section 3 gualifiers Zone 16 in the first semifinal. Zone 13 got the better of the Illawarra side in sectional play and it was a similar story in their second encounter, albeit a much tighter score line. Zone 13 scraped through 54-52, winning two of the three rinks by a single shot to secure their spot in the final. It was a very different story in the second semi-final as Zone 1 came up against Zone 12. Zone 1 surprised the competition when they got the better of a highly fancied Zone 2 side in the guarter finals

by 20 shots, and faced an equally difficult task coming up against the consistently strong Zone 12. Undeterred, the Far North Coast side picked up where they left off the previous day, jumping out of the blocks and playing brilliantly to beat South West Sydney 60-27. Each of the three rinks performed exceptionally to defeat the starstudded Zone 12 outfit.

Congratulations to Zone 1 on a brilliant win, and to all competitors on making this Inter-Zone event one of the best in recent memory. Bowls NSW would like to thank our host clubs Club Maitland City and Lorn Park for their hospitality over the last week.

Zone 15 Win Senior Inter-Zone Championship

Zone 15 have won the 2023 Senior Inter-Zone Sides Championship, beating Zone 2 in a nail-biting final at Club Maitland City. It was an interesting start to the match, with Zone 15 leading strongly on one rink, Zone 2 leading on another rink and the third rink practically even, meaning there was barely any difference between the two sides on the masterboard.

As the match went on, the overall lead was exchanged multiple times, in no small part to the brilliance of the shots being played, particularly by some of the backend players. Mick Beesley (Zone 2) and John Roberts (Zone 15) were just one of the many notable match-ups, with both skips exchanging shots frequently. As the match came down to the final ends, it was Zone 15 with a narrow lead, edging ahead of Zone 2 by five shots with three ends to play. Zone 2 had chances to produce scores at the death and were close to doing so, but in the end they weren't able to secure the required shots. The 59-54 scoreline in favour of Zone 15 was reflective of how close the match was, and particular credit must go to Paul Williams' team who recorded a 29-16 win for Zone 15 to help secure the title.

In the morning semi-finals, Zone 2 came up against Zone 9 and it was a tight affair for most of the match, with barely any shots separating the two sides on the masterboard. Entering into the final third of the match, Zone 2 picked up a gear and started to pick up multiple scores across their three rinks, jumping to a solid lead and running out 65-48 winners. While disappointed with the loss, it was a great campaign for Zone 9 who had topped a tough section featuring Zones 3, 10 and 12.

Zone 15 went head-to-head with Zone 16 in the other semi-final,

which was another cracking match. The live streamed match between Robbie Warren (Zone 16) and Paul Williams (Zone 15) made for brilliant viewing, with both sides exchanging blows and picking up shots in a high scoring affair that finished 26-20 in favour of Zone 16. Despite the rink win, it wasn't enough as Zone 15 secured a 65-55 win, with special mention going to Tony Shoebridge's team who recorded a solid 23-10 win over former South African international Eric Johannes' rink.

Congratulations to Zone 15, Zone 2 and all the sides who competed in another successful Senior Inter-Zone Sides Championship.



Leichhardt Bowlo's 100th Birthday Bash



It's already home to the biggest beer garden in Sydney's Inner West, now Leichhardt Bowling Club has earned another badge of honour after keeping the doors of the beloved community institution open for 100 years.

Friday, 14 April saw the Club's centenary celebrations kick off in the late afternoon with a bowls tournament, a member photo to recreate the founding members' first snap, some glowing words from Leichhardt Mayor Darcy Byrne, and speeches from a few of the venue's much-loved managers, employees and board members — including 31-year-old Chairman Alistair Scott, who is the second-youngest bowling club Chairman in NSW.

The party continued well into the evening, with live music performed

by local blues band The Foreday Riders.

Despite the on-and-off drizzly weather, more than 500 people turned up to enjoy a few beers and a free sausage sandwich, and to share their favourite memories of the bowlo. Tickets quickly sold out for the regular Friday night meat raffle and the Club's famous Golden Bowl draw, which saw one lucky local lady snap up a record \$10,000 when her raffle ticket was plucked from the barrel and she successfully guessed the bowl behind which the golden bowl was hidden.

Saturday and Sunday saw more bowls competitions, live music and family friendly fun — including a jumping castle and free facepainting for the little ones.

What made the 100th birthday

celebrations all the more special was that just a short time ago the Club was in a precarious financial situation, with COVID seeing the venue's audited financials on 30 June 2021 listing cash and cash equivalents well and truly in the red.

"Miraculously, we opened from the first lockdown sooner than expected, and by borrowing some cash from the affiliated bowling clubs we had just enough cash to order stock and float our tills," says Leichhardt Bowling Club Secretary Manager Baz Compton.

"We prayed our members and guests would come back — and they did in droves!"

Baz says in hindsight COVID was a blessing in disguise for the Club.

"It allowed us to put everything on

pause and really take stock of what was working and what wasn't. Our directors and a handful of dedicated volunteers used the COVID lockdowns to give the clubhouse a shoestring facelift — which started with a lick of paint and ended up with us converting a bowling green into the biggest beer garden in the Inner West.

The expansive outdoor area has become enormously popular with younger patrons and families, and is booked out most Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. The vibrant community hub now also boasts a pop-up gin bar, which sees local couple Jen and Shan — the brains behind Lily Fields Distilling Co — serve up classic G&Ts and other creative cocktails every weekend.

At the Club's main bar, patrons can enjoy a selection of regularly rotated craft beers and seltzers, while at the restaurant, 88 on Piper, they can order everything from a classic chicken parmigiana to a special Bangladeshi style roasted baby snapper.

"Converting a bowling green into the beer garden has been the key to our revitalisation but obviously it was a big sacrifice for our sport, however, what's been a really nice surprise is now that we're a more desirable venue to visit we're actually picking up more bowlers than we did with the extra bowling green," says Baz.

"While it's still too early to definitively call it, for the first time in a long time we feel quietly confident that we're not going to just survive but thrive and continue to serve our sport and our community for generations to come".








