Jack Lewis (Engadine) in section four had a great run with three wins with a margin of 41 and a berth in the semi-finals.

Jay Breust has a massive reputation on the South Coast and a welldeserved one, but he seemed to be out of sorts in his semi-final, unable to find his rhythm and eventually going down to Jack Lewis. Jack was clinical throughout the match, making his way to the final in fine fashion.

Peter Taylor, meanwhile, showed again why he is a powerhouse of a bowler and earning a final berth with a good, measured win over Jono Davis. Peter can play the full array of shots available to a bowler and was showing it here in the championships and proved it by winning this game against a tough opponent.

The final was set to be an epic and an epic it was. Both players giving nothing away. End after end of singles until it came to the championship ends. Peter Taylor looked like he had it sewn up with a 24 to 19 lead after a brilliant four shot end. Jack Lewis had to be perfect – and he was.




Women's State Singles

There was a similar storyline popping up through sectional play in the Women's State Singles. Three of the semi-finalists absolutely powered through their sections. The phenomenal Natasha Van Eldik (Raymond Terrace) recorded three wins and a 61 point margin. Local Favourite and Scottish International Kay Moran (Figtree Sports) managed three wins and a 28 point margin and Jessie Cottell (Cabramatta) produced three wins with a 41 point margin.

Much closer was section one with Joanne Cattley (Milton-Ulladulla) playing Melinda Blumor (Engadine) with both of them on two wins each. Those present stood and watched the final end of this match which was long and close and exactly what we like to see as lovers of our sport. Melinda winning 25-24 after Joanne just missed her last shot in a ripper of a game.

The semi-final for Melinda Blumor proved a difficult task as Jessie Cottell dialed-in the weight and nailed the lines on the half-green in front of the Figtree pavilion, comprehensively

Even is where it would stay until Jess was able to land the killer blow to be crowned the Women's State Singles champion for 2022-2023.

Section three was closer with Leba Yatevatu (St Georges Basin), one of the truly beautiful souls in lawn bowls, tying with Deborah Murray (NBC Sports) and Joy Scott (Merimbula), each with two wins. Joy's superior margin was enough to take her through to the semi-finals.

Joan Thomas of Forster won through in section four with two wins and a bye and was looking strong going into the finals.

The semi-finals arrived at Figtree Sports and went the way of Joan Thomas (Forster) and Wendy Clarke (Ballina). Both players were coming into great form as they won 25 shots to 15, setting up an enticing final.

This year's Men's Senior Singles champion had an extra incentive to take the title which may have proved the difference, but more on that later!

In Section One, Greg Laws (Carlingford) kicked off his campaign with three wins and a big margin. 2021 State Senior Singles Runner-Up Bernie Melville (Alexandria-Erskineville) did it a bit harder in his section with a win by margins to make it to the semi-finals.

Kris Lehfeldt from Pottsville had a good run into the finals winning three games to make it through as did Mark Blackwood from Mona Vale, showing some good form to make it through a tough section that included KENO NSW Senior Blues representative Ken Snowdon (Merimbula), Greg Brims (Westport) and Phil Westcott (Ettalong Memorial).

In the first semi-final Bernie Melville flexed hard with a huge win over Greg Laws despite his strong showing in the sections. It was a harder game for Kris Lehfeldt, narrowly winning his semi-final game 25-21 against Mark Blackwood.

The final kicked off as we expected, a see-sawing affair. Spectators witnessed a remarkable run of ends where Bernie would be holding big multiples only to be dragged back with rescuing bowls by Kris. A brilliantly even game the whole way until Kris managed to score the final shots to take the crown as the Senior Men's Singles champion.

In an interesting twist, back in 1993 Kris had played to win in the Men's State Singles at Figtree Sports and lost. Thirty years later he was able to receive redemption, claim a trophy and finally be crowned state champion.

State Open Reserve Singles

The qualifiers of this competition showed up strongly early with the only woman in the open competition, Kate Carriage (Nowra), winning all three games in her section to fire her way to the semi-final.

Section two's eventual winner, David Kahlfeldt (Engadine) impressed his large crowd of supporters with three strong wins in a tough section. Similarly, Wayne Ede (West Pennant Hills Sports) won through with three wins albeit with closer margins and a winning aggregate of 8 shots.

The final section, Nathan Kent from Campbelltown won through on shot difference after finishing level with Jeffrey Nolan (Bangalow) on two wins. A 25-11 final round loss for Jeffrey to Tony Parkes from West Wyalong proved crucial, giving Nathan the superior shot margin to top the section.

The semi-finals were set. Kate Carriage to take on David Kahlfeldt and Wayne Ede to face off against Nathan Kent. None of the players had it all their own way. Having shifted to the finals venue of Figtree Sports from their sectional play venues, it took a few ends for the players to adjust. The player that adjusted the best would do better and so it would seem, Kate winning her way though and so did Wayne.

The final started on the number 2 rink closest to the club entrance. The early ends were close with Wayne Ede finding the advantage but then Kate Carriage kicked away. She scored several multiples and showed her strength and obvious skill with an incredible display of bowls to win the match 25-10.

Unusually for sectional play, all four sections had a clear winner. The four semi-finalists winning all of their games to make it through for a chance. Corey Wedlock & Gary Kelly (Warilla), Craig Maythers & Christopher Couchman (Austral), Beau Prideaux & Carl Healey (Cabramatta) and Mark Cross & Bernie Melville (Alexandria Erskineville) the confirmed semifinalists with the chance to win a championship medal.

The first semi-final was a tight affair with the Cabramatta team of Jackaroo Carl Healey and emerging Jackaroo Beau Prideaux having a bit of a scare from the Alexadria-Erskineville team led by the indomitable Bernie Melville but winning through in a close match 19-14.

In one of the most remarkable sectional scores ever Ellen Falkner & Karen Murphy (Cabramatta) won through top of their section with two wins a draw and a score differential of an enormous 48 shots. necessarily remarkable for players of Ellen Falkner and Karen Murphy's legendary capability but they only just got up over the all-conquering team of Genevieve Delves & Natasha Van Eldik (Raymond Terrace) who had a 44 point differential. They are also the two teams that played in one of the best games we've seen on our live stream.

The last team through blitzed their opposition with three wins and 68 points in the positive. With these results, many saw them as serious contenders for the championship.



A foreboding task faced Forster in the final, coming up against Raymond Terrace who have essentially owned the Women's State Triples having won it six times in the past eight years. Forster started well but found it tough to keep pace with the consistency of the Jets trio. Kate Matthews was at it again, delivering the shortest of short lengths to an accuracy of a few centimetres over and over again. The powerhouse duo of Genevieve Delves and Natasha Van Eldik, fresh from an Australian Open pairs win, were deadly accurate and they won the day 23 shots to 6. A dominant display by the newly crowned State Champions who will head to Perth with a lot of confidence.

Another star-studded lineup arrived for the State Championship Men's Triples and the sections proved difficult to get out of and into the next round. The biggest winners were Jack Lewis, Callum Murray & Mason Lewis (Engadine) with three wins and a 46 shot differential.

Three wins to Trevor Gillis, Craig Roberts & Lee Stinson from Warilla saw them nicely into a semi-final. In section two, Michael Phillips, Heath Lewis & Darren Morrison (Merrylands) got through on two wins and a positive score differential with every team below them with a negative score.

The familiar names of Jamie Minter, Ian Lean & Shannon Gittoes (Raymond Terrace) made up the last of the semi-finalists after two wins and a narrow 9-point differential in their favour over David Dilworth, Nathan Dawson & Brody Pitham (Club Maitland City).

The semi-finals were two very different affairs. Darren Morrison and the team from Merrylands were in control against Raymond Terrace despite the obvious skill of Shannon




Men's Senior Fours


The semi-finals were an exciting pair of games with the evenly matched










BowlsLink Basics Learning Module Now Available

State Umpires Committee Keeping things Crystal Clear



With the deletion of Law .37.1.3 and Law 37.1.5.3, which took effect on the 25th May 2023, two other laws have resulted in questions being emailed to the State Umpires Committee, those laws being, Law 29.1.4 (new law) and Law 29.4.2. Both these laws are very similar in their wording.

1. Law 29.1.4

If a bowl has been played by each team or player in Singles before the players discover that one of them has played out of turn, play in that end must continue in that order.

Law 29.1.4 comes under Law 29.1 Playing out of turn. If a bowl has been played by each team or player in Singles before it is discovered that one of them has played out of turn, then play in that end must continue in that order.

In the past Law 29.1.2. & 29.1.3 were an option depending on the circumstances.

Laws 29.1.2 & 29.1.3 can only be used if the mistake is found once the bowl played out of turn has come to rest and the next bowl has not been

delivered.

If the circumstances have occurred as per Law 29.1.4 then Laws 29.1.2 & 29.1.3 must not be used.

2. Law 29.4.2

If a bowl has been played by each team before the players discover that one of them has failed to play a bowl in the proper order, that player will lose the right to play the bowl. Law 29.4.2 comes under Law 29.4.2 Failing to play. If a bowl has been played by each team before they discover that one of the team has failed to play a bowl, then that player forfeits the right to play that bowl. This law refers to team games, Pairs, Triples & Fours. And it is not a new law.

An occurrence that has become noticeable over the past 12 to 24 months is the reluctance of umpires to make themselves aware of the Bowls NSW Conditions of Play. Umpires must make themselves aware of the contents of the current Bowls NSW Conditions of Play, as you may be required act on or make a ruling on a section of the COPs during a game. For example:

General Conditions for all Events:

- Section 24. Bowls Stickers/ Adhesive Markings.
- Section 27. Inclement Weather.
- Section 29. Personal Electronic Devices.
- Section 31. Coaching.
- Section 32. Delaying Play.
- Section 33. Restricting Movement of Players.
- Section 35. Instantaneous Penalties.

Apart from the General Conditions for All Events, there are a number of COPs specific to State controlled events, if you have been appointed to officiate at one of those events ensure you read the COPs for that event.
